Academic and Student Affairs (www.capital.edu/academic-affairs)

The Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs of the university is principally responsible for faculty and academic programs. The Provost reports directly to the President and serves as the campus representative in the President's absence. The Provost is the University's chief academic officer, with responsibility for managing the policies and practices that affect the academic life of the University as a whole.

Capital University provides Public Safety officers on campus 24 hours a day seven days a week for your protection. After-Hours Care and Emergencies

If you feel you are in a life-threatening situation and you're on Bexley's campus, call Public Safety at 614-236-6666. If Public Safety determines you don't need to be taken to the emergency room, an officer will contact Residence Life and Housing staff (even for students who don't live on campus) so that an on-site staff member can help assess your need and contact the appropriate on-call center staff member.

Commuter and residential students may contact Residence Life and Housing at 614-323-3282.

Residential students should consult with their Resident Assistant or Area Director.
